SUPER MARIO BROS. 2 (NES)

This game introduces two new characters and gives them unique abilities to help players navigate through twenty levels and seven worlds in the Mushroom Kingdom. SMB 2 also added the ability to lift and toss enemies and objects, which remains a staple move in Mario's repertoire. TONY HAWK'S PRO SKATER (PS)



The flagship game in the series, Tony Hawk Pro Skater defined the skateboarding genre. Released in 1999, the title included ten playable professional skateboarders and two hidden characters. It was an instant hit due to the addictive gameplay and thrashing Punk/Ska soundtrack which featured the likes of Primus, Goldfinger, and Suicidal Tendencies. While the majority of the page is inked by the talented Frank Giacoia, the Matt Murdock/Daredevil figures in the issue were inked by comic book legend Wally Wood.









ACTION COMICS #10

The First World War was seared into the world's mass consciousness in the early 20th century. Comic covers such as this, in which Superman seems to be battling against war as a concept rather than against a defined enemy, were common in the pre-Pearl Harbor days. This Superman image is a far cry from the beefy, smiling patriot soon to grace WWII DC covers, and still startles with its raw emotion and power. This is yet another extremely rare early Action Comic that commands top dollar on the Golden Age market.

ACTION COMICS #13

Scarcely a year after his debut, the Man of Steel had become such an undeniable sensation that DC capitalized on his fame by giving him his own self-titled comic. Not only notable for its announcement of the character's upcoming solo series, this issue also boasts the debut of Superman's first real arch-nemesis, the Ultra-Humanite. Clearly inspired by villains from Saturday serials and Republic B-thrillers, the wheelchair-bound mad genius proves a cunning rival for our protagonist. A truly historic issue no matter how you slice it and, as with so many of these early Actions, is extremely rare.

ALL STAR COMICS #8


DC's Big Three were blessed with auspicious beginnings. All Star Comics #8 did for Wonder Woman what Action #1 and Detective #27 did for Superman and Batman. The upside potential of this issue cannot be stressed enough. Wonder Woman's overdue solo film debut received critical acclaim and birthed a whole new generation of fans and feminists alike; the Amazonian Princess' third silver screen adventure is currently slated for a 2023 release.

In this issue-length storyline, the fearsome Solomon Grundy has escaped from imprisonment and is on the warpath to bring down his hated nemesis, the Green Lantern. This awesome issue is a whole lot of fun, highlighting the continuing metamorphosis from anthology to single-story comics that were coming into voque, this book did a lot to help make Solomon Grundy one of the premiere DC bad guys, establishing him as a mainstay of the publisher for decades to come.

This is the Silver Age equivalent of Action Comics #1: a historic, game-changing key issue that acts as a pivot point from what came before, and what came after. The creation of Stan Lee and Steve Ditko, this radical new concept featured a passive, neurotic, everyman hero; an unusually emotionally charged origin story touching on issues of mortality and family tragedy; a worldview grounded solidly in a real, recognizable universe obviously our own; and open-ended storytelling that rewarded close attention and regular readership. This milestone has also proven to be the success story of comics investment, growing rapidly and unstoppably in value and becoming one of the few completely bulletproof investments in recent times.

Her romantic entanglements with Batman are the stuff of legend, and this issue is where it all started. Serious fans of Poison Ivy need to own a copy of this key book.

DAREDEVIL #1



You can tell from the Spider-Man plug on the cover that Marvel had, by the time of this book's release, become known as a hero machine by pumping out high-gloss, high-energy heroes and heroines, which sold like hotcakes. In this case, the House of Ideas picked up a Biro character name, which had been left to linger, dusted it off, and added the enticing gimmick of their Daredevil being blind and a lawyer, providing both courtroom intrigue and a great hook. It would take a while for the character to fully hit his stride, but the dynamic Kirby cover and ravishing Everett interiors attracted readers and established Daredevil as a unique and mature alternative to cosmic adventure and teenage angst.





Detective Comics is the longest-running title in the history of the medium and is most commonly known as the birthplace of Batman who was a logical extension of the popular pulp magazines that were the forerunners of the modern comic book. INCREDIBLE HULK #1



Inspired by Jekyll & Hyde, and the Jewish myth of the Golem, Stan Lee and Jack Kirby kept their hot-streak running with the big and brutal Hulk. This instant classic preys on Cold War fears of nuclear annihilation and the average American boy's body discomfort to create one of the most haunting and affecting of hero origins. Colored gray in his first appearance, the character was quickly reworked into a big green beast when the primitive four-color printing process mangled the newly minted monstrosity's color scheme throughout the book, altering the Hulk's hue from page to page. The famous cover image still resonates with fans to this day. This comic is consistently one of the most valuable and sought-after of Silver Age keys, introducing a Marvel character that would prove to have a long-lasting impact. The Green Goliath's premiere issue never fails to garner frenzied activity in our auctions.


NEW FUN COMICS #6

TEENAGE MUTANT NINJA TURTLES #1

Anybody who grew up in the 1980s understands the significance of this comic book. It is the Amazina Fantasy #15 of the era. Self-published by scrappy creators Kevin Eastman and Peter Laird, this book contains the origin stories of the Ninja Turtles and Splinter, as well as the introduction of Shredder, and the Foot. The moody cover featuring deep blacks and bloody reds is an homage to Frank Miller's Ronin mini-series. Eastman and Laird's characters were soon to be toned down and made more child-friendly, but in these early books, they pulled no punches on the way to devouring their beloved pizza pies.

X-MEN #1



Stan Lee once explained that his original title for this series was "The Mutants" but publisher Martin Goodman didn't like the sound of it. Lee, in a stroke of genius, named the newly formed group after its founder, Professor X, and thus the X-Men was born. They were a motley band of outcasts, hated and feared by the human world. The title was almost canceled due to lagging sales but was reborn with a new cast of characters in the 70s which went on to make them a perennial favorite. Everybody can relate to what it is like being an outsider, and that is what draws us to the X-Men. With a staggering number of comic spin-offs, blockbuster movies, and a variety of TV shows and cartoons, the popularity of this first issue has proven to be a strong investment piece with staying power in the marketplace.
